

# IMPACT IN WAUKESHA COUNTY



### TOGETHER, WE ARE ENDING FAMILY HOMELESSNESS.

"The idea of losing my home felt absolutely terrifying," said Crystal, a Waukesha resident and mother. "The best way I can describe the last few years of my life is in one word: trauma."

Crystal's challenges were medically related, and the struggles she faced contributed to a loss of income. "As a mother," Crystal said, "the feeling was overwhelming. I wanted to protect and keep my family safe."

In 2019, United Way established the Safe & Stable Homes initiative and set a goal: end family homelessness in our region.

One of the strategies of Safe & Stable Homes is to fund programs at nonprofits that assist families facing homelessness. One of those nonprofits is Family Promise of Waukesha County.

"What's great about Family Promise and Safe & Stable Homes is that it focuses on homelessness prevention," said Courtney Rutkowski, Director of Family Services at Family Promise. "The support we receive from United Way allows us to do our best to avoid the trauma of having to uproot their lives."

Over the past several years, great progress has been made in Waukesha regarding family homelessness.

- There are more shelter beds available for families that need them. This allows people to have a safe place to stay as they transition to a home.
- There is improved collaboration of service providers. Family-serving agencies meet regularly to discuss steps to keep people in their homes.
- There is improved data collection on family homelessness and an improved Coordinated Entry. This allows Waukesha to match families to the right resources.

Crystal smiles when she thinks back on the support she received from Family Promise. "If it wasn't for them, I don't know where I would be today."

In 2023, United Way's Safe & Stable Homes initiative served over 450 Waukesha County parents and children.

#### **UNITED WAY HELPS WAUKESHA COUNTY RESIDENTS**

It isn't about what we fund, but who we help. Together, we are changing lives in Waukesha County.

- Our community is healthier. Last year, over 8,500 children and adults had increased access to health care programs, and health and wellness services.
- More young people are succeeding in school. Last year, over 9,000 children or their parents/caregivers received support for early childhood education, youth development, and educational services.
- Families facing economic challenges are being helped. Last year, over 3,300 people utilized financial stabilityfunded programs. In addition, over 1,500 individuals were helped through the United Way-funded Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program at La Casa de Esperanza.

#### **Helping Kids Succeed**

United Way works directly with the School District of Waukesha to address specific needs of select schools. These efforts include supporting parent liaisons, mental health navigators, quality after-school programs, and more.

#### A few of the highlights:

- The PATH program provided over 100 students with at-school mental health therapy, delivering over 1,900 therapeutic hours to students.
- Playworks delivered high-quality recess programming to five elementary schools that made play safer, more student-led, and more fun for nearly 2,000 students.
